Indigenous Athlete of the month (continuing from May)



Fred Sasakamoose (1933–2020) was an important figure in Canadian hockey history and came from Big River First Nation in Saskatchewan. He made history as the first Indigenous player to compete in the NHL. In 1953, Fred played junior hockey with the Moose Jaw Canucks in the Western Canada Junior Hockey League, where he had an outstanding season. During the 1953–54 season, he scored 31 goals in just 34 games and was recognized as the league's most valuable player. His strong performance earned him a spot with the Chicago Blackhawks, where he played 11 NHL games. Later in life, his contributions to hockey and his community were honored when he was made a member of the Order of Canada in 2018.

Be tick aware in Nova Scotia

After a long and snow-filled winter, we're finally headed toward summer – a season when many people spend time at Nova Scotia's beautiful beaches, parks, and wooded areas. However, we need to be mindful of the presence of ticks and how we can protect ourselves. Nova Scotia is home to several kinds of ticks, but only blacklegged tick bites can cause illnesses like Lyme disease, Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis and Powassan virus. Tick-borne diseases can lead to serious illness, especially if they are not noticed and treated quickly.

It's important that we all know what to do about ticks, so if you've asked yourself any of these questions lately:

- What does a tick look like?
- What do I do if I find a tick on me or my child?
- What symptoms should I be aware of?
- How can I prevent ticks?
